PUBLIC HEALTH HIGHLIGHT: TICK AWARENESS

Rock County Public Health Department (RCPHD) and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services have joined forces and are asking for your help to collect ticks found in Rock County!

The 2023 tick season is underway. To help prevent the spread of disease in Rock County, RCPHD's Environmental Health team is providing tick collection vials to local veterinary clinics in order to better track the County's tick population.

Don't take home hitchhikers!

When enjoying Rock County's beautiful public parks, look out for tick collection stations where you can place ticks to be collected at a later date. Before leaving the park, check yourself, your family, and pets for ticks. Placing them in the jar below the sign at each station will ensure they don't catch a ride with anyone else. Make sure to submerge the tick into the solution in the jar so they don't crawl out.
