PUBLIC HEALTH HIGHLIGHT: AUGUST IS BREASTFEEDING MONTH

August is National Breastfeeding Month. This year's theme "Nourish, Sustain, Thrive" highlights the importance of protecting, promoting, and supporting lactation practices and policies. Breastfeeding provides numerous health benefits and helps build strong relationships between parents and their children. Human milk is:

- Rich in nutrients and provides easily digestible proteins and carbohydrates.
- Provides many essential fatty acids necessary for brain development, antibodies, and other elements to help fight infection and stimulate the immune response, and probiotics for a healthy gut biome.
- Reduces the risk for certain chronic health conditions, including asthma, obesity, or type 1 diabetes in babies.
- Breastfeeding also provides health benefits for mothers, including reducing risks for breast cancer, ovarian cancer, or type 2 diabetes.

Many people want to breastfeed, but they may encounter many barriers to doing so successfully or for as long as they desire. Some of the largest obstacles include a lack of support for breastfeeding at work or with childcare facilities.

RCPH recognizes the importance of human milk feeding. We provide breastfeeding-friendly technical assistance to worksites and childcare sites, including training and recognition. For a childcare or worksite, being breastfeeding-friendly means, at a minimum, having a designated space for pumping/feeding and having a policy that supports breastfeeding parents. For childcares, we follow the 10 Steps to Breastfeeding Friendly Childcares from the Wisconsin Breastfeeding Coalition to ensure employees know how to support parents and are educated on human milk storage, handling, and feeding.

Supporting breastfeeding also has many benefits for businesses. Employers who provide a supportive environment to help women continue breastfeeding after childbirth enjoy many proven benefits that directly affect their bottom line, including:

- Lower health care costs
- Lower turnover rates
- Lower absenteeism rates
- Higher employee productivity and morale
- Positive public relations in the community as a "family friendly" business
- Compliance with the FSLA "PUMP Act" and title IX

Join us at the <u>Rock County Overdose Awareness Walk</u> on August 31 from 2-5 p.m. at Riverside Park in Beloit.


This annual event raises awareness about overdose, and provides opportunities to share stories of recovery and remember those we have lost to overdose.

E. Coli Awareness

We thank our partners at <u>WKOW</u> and <u>WCLO</u> for bringing attention to the high E. coli levels RCPH located in several recreational waters including the Yahara River, Badfish Creek, Turtle Creek, the Rock River, and some small streams in July.

E. coli is a bacteria that is natural in surface water, but at high levels, it can be an indication of a risk of exposure to pathogens that can cause gastrointestinal illness. Those most at risk to develop illness are children, the elderly, and people with compromised immune systems. The main risk is through ingestion of the contaminated water.


